Folks, it has been a long time since I had a sailing adventure to report on. Unfortunately, I only have limited space to tell you about it for now. I do plan to have a meeting program on this adventure, in particular the destination, Fort Jefferson, at a future meeting.

In the course of lining up a Gemini catamaran to review for Good Old Boat magazine, the owner of the boat I chose to review asked if I wished to join him and two crew for a cruise from Ft. Myers Beach, Florida to the Dry Tortugas. I did not have to think about that long. I got to Ft. Myers and stayed with RYC founding member, John Capittelli at his and Pam's newly acquired condo on the Caloosahatchee River for a few days before heading out on the adventure. John's MacGregor 26X is kept at a slip in front of the condo on the river - and he's only a mile from the active nightlife of downtown Ft. Myers. Untie the lines and go sailing - no motoring for miles to reach the gulf. Very nice. John and Pam are very much enjoying escaping winter at their new place. Additionally, I drove out to where Dave and Joy Tarrant winter in nearby LaBelle and spent an evening with them. I am planning to do a Good Old Boat review on John's MacGregor as well.

The 1999 Gemini M105 cat belongs to Henry & Linda McKivitt, it's name is Linda Lee. We sailed in the company of another boat, a Westsail 28 crewed by father and son. Due to weather, our departure was delayed. But once underway we found ever growing winds and seas, until we were faced with beam and breaking following seas of 5-10 feet that were quite close together. Exciting is an understatement. After arriving at Fort Jefferson (70 miles west of Key West) all boats were pinned down for three days by high winds. Not even the ferry boat came out. This left the fort to our brave crew who managed to get Linda Lee to the ferry dock for a day on Wednesday, and again on Thursday. Although on Thursday the ferry boat was back with plenty of tourists. Snorkeling was okay, but limited to the edge of the fort. The trip back was mostly a motorboat ride because the wind was too close to our course - though not without incident. Twice large pods of porpoises swam with us close by.
