Hope to see you all at our January meeting.



Winter Boating – Marty O’Connor

When the days grow short and the wind chill drops, some of us non-migratory boaters fail to reach more hospitable lower latitudes. Of course, I truly relish the change of seasons, adapting plans to local conditions with as much spontaneity (read: lack of forethought) I can manage, given my short attention span and limited resources. Fortunately, we have several paddle craft, and live only a half-block from the Kishwaukee River, which often develops its most kayak-friendly streamflows between early winter snowmelts, before really frigid temperatures set in. This season has been almost ideal so far, with high enough water levels and few freezing days, so I’ve gotten on the water several times already since Christmas. What I enjoy most is the easy escape provided from ordinary human hustle and bustle, even when passing along railroads or under highway bridges noisily reminds you of its dominance. Most of the time, you’ll find the tranquil solitude within the river banks invigorating, and evidence of nature totally captivating.

DeKalb’s section of the Kishwaukee river is rather narrow, with minimal drop, so during dry spells, there is rarely enough depth for paddling, but even at flood stages, the speed of the current rarely impedes upstream travel. This works out well for me, because I can usually put in and take out close to home, no shuttle needed. In the last two weeks, I’ve paddled about 6.5 miles upstream and 9.9 miles downstream over four outings, which required only one retrieval by car, after a 3.5 mile downstream trip through town.

While going solo provides a casual escape, it can be very frustrating to miss an opportunity to share wonderfully unique experiences with friends. When there is snow on the ground, it can be difficult to convince someone to join you. Other times, there are minor technical problems. When I was out the first time on Dec 30th, I saw a pair of red foxes along the banks almost immediately after put-in while heading downstream. Before I could aim a camera, they spooked and ran across a busy road to the park upstream. After an hour or so paddling around backwaters of the original stream bed, an area usually inaccessible unless water levels are high enough to exit a man-made channel revision, I

headed back upstream. When I neared a footbridge connecting the park to the grounds of a nearby school, I spotted one of the foxes trotting slowly across the bridge, stopping to glance nervously back for its companion, before scampering the rest of the way when a man unknowingly approached on the walk. The pedestrian crossed, apparently oblivious to me or the fox, and I noticed the other fox scramble out of the brush toward the area I had seen them originally. Anticipating a rare opportunity, I parked myself in a spot about 10 yards from the bridge and set my phone to video. Sure enough, the first fox re-emerged and came toward the bridge in an effort to rejoin its pal. I hit record and focused as the fox trotted back across the bridge and off on a mission to reunite. However, when I stopped recording, I found that it had failed to start the first time.....ARRRRGHHH!

So, next Christmas, I’m hoping for a better camera with versatile mounting and reliable triggering.
